BRIEFING FOR EDITORS ON THE FALKLAND ISLAND EMERGENCY

With the Secretary of State's approval, PUS invited Editors from the major media organisations to a briefing at the Ministry of Defence at 6.00 pm on Wednesday 7 April. A list of those who attended is shown at Annex A (together with the names of their correspondents with the Task Force).

- 2. It was agreed that the meeting would consist of three parts:
 - (I) An opening statement by PUS (which would be entirely private).
 - (II) Background briefing on the situation by MOD staffs (which could be used unattributably).
 - (III) A closing discussion (which would again be private).

Part I

3. PUS said that he welcomed an opportunity to discuss the arrangements for media coverage of the military aspects of the Falklands situation. No doubt the Editors would have requests to make and the Ministry of Defence would want to be as helpful as possible. But there was also concern that information should not be published which could assist the Argentinians, inhibit operations or put the Task Force and its crews at risk. He would like to come back to discuss this further in Part III.

Part II

4. Short briefings were given on the Government's approach to the emergency by AUS(D Staff) (Mr Stewart) and on the Falkland Isles and Islanders by DD Ops (RoW) (Captain Lord RN - a former CO of HMS ENDURANCE). There followed questions covering the capability of the Argentinian Armed Forces, the 1977 deployment and the potential of the UK Task Force (Captain Livesey RN, Director of Naval Warfare and former CO of HMS INVINCIBLE took part in this).

Part III

5. Returning to discussion of media coverage of the emergency, PUS said that MOD was particularly concerned about publication of information in the following areas:

- Details of operational plans or too much speculation about them.
- Details of operational capability.
- Information about intelligence, especially in the field of communications.
- Information about the location of units. d.

What this really amounted to was asking Editors to observe the D Notices, which had recently been revised, and particularly Notices 1 (Plans, Operational Capability) and 6 (Security and Intelligence). As usual the Secretary, Rear Admiral Ash, was ready to advise Editors over specific cases. There was also concern over Argentinian disinformation - an example was their exaggerated statements about the build up of their forces on the Falkland Islands.

- In discussion, some Editors wondered whether speculation about British military intentions might not be as confusing to the Argentinians as it was helpful. There was also no way of preventing the Foreign Press from engaging in this, though they lacked the implicit authority of the British Press. It was suggested as a general criterion for Editors that they imagined what they would want to see broadcast or in print if they had a son aboard the Task Force.
- Turning to assistance to the media, there was general satisfaction with the arrangements made by MOD for correspondents to join the Task Force (although complaints at some organisations not being represented eg the Sunday Telegraph _ this has now been remedied _ 7). It was agreed that there should be daily MOD briefings for correspondents in London, preferably with FCO representation. further meeting with Editors would be arranged in a week to ten days' time.
- 8. The meeting finished at 7.10.

Comment

In general, Editors responded carefully but positively and were appreciative that the meeting had taken place. The high level of representation was noticeable. There was inevitably some concern at the possible fettering of editorial freedom - particularly over speculation on military intentions - but relief that the Government was not putting forward ideas for legal controls. It was implicit that the fact that the meeting had taken place would not itself be publicised.

Postscript

Since the meeting the MOD has started to receive requests from journalists writing pieces on the Falklands for guidance on particular areas of sensitivity.
