I have some doubts about that. After all, I saw the Secretary General myself in New York only about ten days ago. Mr. Healey has seen him more recently and I suspect that if Mr. Pym were to go and see him, he would get the same answer as we both have, which is that there is no role at the moment for the United Nations in solving the immediate dispute. There may well be a role for the United Nations in either the short term or long term administration but in terms of getting the dispute settled, unfortunately the have not yet reached the ideal world where the UN has a police force which is able to do this. We have to do it ourselves.
