

PRESS STATEMENT BY THE PRIME MINISTER AND MINISTER OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS, RT HON DAVID LANGE MP

APPOINTMENT OF HIGH COMMISSIONER TO LONDON

The appointment of Mr Bryce Harland as New Zealand High Commissioner to London was announced today by the Minister of Foreign Affairs, the Rt Hon David Lange. Mr Harland, who will take up his appointment shortly, succeeds the late Hon J.A. Walding.

A career Foreign Affairs officer, Mr Harland is currently New Zealand's Permanent Representative to the United Nations. He was formerly New Zealand's first Ambassador to China and North Vietnam. Mr Harland's earlier overseas assignments were to Singapore, Bangkok, New York and Washington. He was an Assistant Secretary in Foreign Affairs before taking up his posting to New York.

In making the announcement Mr Lange paid tribute to the substantial contribution made by Mr Walding during the short time that he held the London position. He was confident that New Zealand's interests would continue to be well looked after with Mr Harland's appointment. "Mr Harland's qualifications and broad experience make him a remarkably good advocate of New Zealand's position," said Mr Lange.

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

Mr Bruce Brown, the New Zealand Acting High Commissioner, wrote to the Prime Minister about the proposal to nominate Mr Bryce Harland, currently New Zealand's Permanent Representative in New York, as High Commissioner in London. He would succeed Mr Joseph Walding who died here in June.

The advice of our Permanent Representative in New York is that Mr Harland is an able diplomat who has capably represented the views of the present New Zealand Government. He has also gone out of his way to seek British views, and has proved a business-like colleague. We see no reason why the Prime Minister should not tell the New Zealanders in the customary terms that she welcomes the appointment.

I attach a draft which you might send to Mr Bruce Brown informing him of this.
